NAPLAN

This week parents from Years 3, 5 and 7 will be receiving your child's results. This year the sheets sent have slightly changed with two added sheets. In the envelope you will find the Individual Student report, Individual Summary report and the Standard Education Achievement. The Individual Student Report is produced for every student who participated in NAPLAN 2021. The report provides the student's achievement score and proficiency level.

The Individual Student Summary Report provides a summary of student progress, achievement score, proficiency level and progress in reading and numeracy between 2019 and 2021. The Standard of Education Achievement Student Report supports schools to monitor education progress and achievement in reading and numeracy for all students that have undertaken NAPLAN in 2021.

When reviewing your child's results if you are not sure of anything please do not hesitate to contact your child's classroom teacher if you require further clarification about any of the reports supplied to you. As we are heading into term four, I would like to remind families that early next term we will begin planning and formulating what 2022 will look like. It will be very different for us next year with year levels being from Reception to Year 6.

Term 3 BULLY AUDIT:

Our students have participated in the second bully online audit for the year. 'Bullies' are those students identified 3 or more times on the individual class summary sheets. 89% of the students said they have not been recently bullied, 50% have asked for help and 3% said they would still like further help with the issue. Whilst we didn't have anyone identified as 'bullies', a few students who were named which staff will be monitoring during term 4. Similarly to term 1 these incidences primarily occurred in class and at play times on the oval and in the courtyard involving name calling/ teasing and pushing each other. We will continue to provide positive strategies for them to be successful and for other students to feel safe around them. Please remember that it is always best to talk to staff as soon as possible should any issues arise so they can be dealt with as they occur.

ACER PAT Testing

All Year 1-7's have now completed the mandated online PAT testing in both Literacy and Numeracy and from Year 3-7 testing in Science as well as Vocabulary. PAT testing in literacy and numeracy occurs in all DfE schools in the last 4 weeks of Term 3 every year. They are useful tools to inform teaching and learning and help monitor progress of students. Adelaide Youth Orchestra String Quartet – Free Schools Tour - Wednesday 25th August

On Wednesday the 25th of August we were fortunate to host the Adelaide Youth Orchestra String Quartet for two interactive performances at our school. Four young instrumentalists played pieces on the violin, viola and cello to the whole school over two 40 minute sessions. They sounded amazing, inspiring many students to ask questions about what it is like or what is involved in learning and playing a string instrument.

INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC AT THE 'HUB'

Department for Education Instrumental Music Instrumental music education has a strong and proud history in South Australia. Instrumental Music (IM) provides small-group instrumental music lessons to students in government schools. More than \$11 million is invested in music education in government schools. More than 80 teachers and employees lead instrumental music in metropolitan and regional locations. Musical instruments taught include: Woodwind, brass, percussion, classical guitar and electric bass (years 5-12) - **Strings** from year 3 (**double bass** from year 5)

LEARNING AN INSTRUMENT BENEFITS FOR STUDENTS:

- strong support as they move from primary to secondary school music
- pathways to central ensembles, the Primary Schools Music Festival and Adelaide Youth Orchestra
- access to high-quality music performance programs

We are very fortunate here at the **Aberfoyle Hub to offer a strings tuition program** (run through the Department for Education). Lessons for violin, viola and cello are provided by our strings teacher Kirsty Friebe once a week and students only have to pay for the hiring of their chosen instrument.

Students wanting to learn a string instrument next year car obtain a **"Request for Instrumental Tuition Form for 2022"** from the front office or Mrs Nicholas in term 4.

Hola amigos. This is the last week of the term. This week I challenge you all to learn one word in Spanish. The Word for this week is: "Vale". What does Vale means in Spanish?. Vale is a word that we use for almost everything:

Do you want a cup of tea? Vale.

Would you like to come to my house for dinner? Vale. Let's go to the beach, Vale?

This word is mostly used in Spain, and there is a similar word in South America with the same meaning, which is "Dale".

As you probably have realised, we use Vale as a way to confirm or agree with someone, like ok, sure, fine or good. However, Vale has more meanings:

- It is also a form of the verb "Valer", to cost. ¿Cuánto vale esa casa? (How much does that house cost?)
- To use, ¿Para qué vale esto? (What is this used for?)
- As a ticket. Tengo un vale para el cine. (I have a ticket for the cinema).
- No vale la pena (It's not worth it).





So, many uses for the word Vale, now try to practice this word at home and let your teacher know some examples, Vale?
